



PREPOSITIONS OF TIME:

AT, ON, and IN

- We use at to designate specific times. The computer technician starts at 7 o'clock. He finishes work at midnight.
- We use on to designate days and dates. My sister is coming <u>on</u> Saturday. We're having a party on the twenty-fifth of April / on New Year's Day.

We use in for nonspecific times during a day, a month, a season, or a year. She likes to surf the Net in the morning. He's going on holiday in August. It's too hot in summer to run outside. He started the job in 1990.

AT	IN	ON
at 8 o'clock	in October	on Monday
at night / midnight	in 2009	on Tuesday morning
at midday	in Summer	on Wednesday afternoon
at the weekend	in the morning	on Friday evening
at Christmas	in the afternoon	on Sunday night
at Easter	in ten minutes	on the twenty-first of June
at the end of	in 2 days/weeks/years	on New Year's Day
at the moment	in the 21 st century	on Christmas Day

We use <u>NO</u> preposition before:

This... (this afternoon, this month, etc) **Next...** (next Saturday, next week, etc)

last... (last week, last April, etc) every...(every day, every month, etc)
